Heritage TRAILS

Listed as a "City [then Land] of Art and History" by the French Ministry of Culture since 1987, Angoulême benefits from a rich heritage which it preserves and showcases. The three trails guide visitors towards the most recognisable places in the heart of the city and its walls down to the Charente River. Enamelled lava stone heritage signs offer a wealth of information on the monuments and places to discover. The "heart of the city" trail is also signposted with metal studs pinned into the ground to help visitors find their way around more easily. The various trails reveal a rich and diverse heritage, serving as an ode to a prestigious past with detours to squares and narrow streets. From the city walls you can enjoy magnificent views of nature and the Charente Valley, before heading down towards the Charente River.

COMICS

For several decades, Angoulême has built its reputation on bande dessinée [comics]. Beyond the international comic festival, which has been held every year since 1974, the heart of the city beats all year round to the rhythm of bande dessinée, or the «ninth art», as it is known in France. During this trail, you will discover virtually all the facets that have helped shape the identity of Angoulême. The city is home to over thirty painted walls and several statues, paying tribute to the great comic book authors and depicting various themes and famous characters. La Cité Internationale de la Bande Dessinée et de l'Image [International Centre for Comics and Images] plays a unique role thanks to its museum, exhibitions, conservation missions and dedication to creativity. For its part, the Pôle Image Magelis regionally funded office contributes to the sector's economic development, namely by supporting comics, animation, film shooting and video games. You can discover this rich ensemble on the trail, which can be completed in several stages and complemented by artworks located outside the city centre.



Follow the footsteps of LUCIEN DE RUBEMPRÉ

Between 1831 and 1833, the French writer Honoré de Balzac (1799 - 1850) stayed in Angoulême three times. He even chose this provincial city as the location for the first part of his novel Lost Illusions (1836-1843). The story unfolds between 1820 and 1825 and portrays Lucien Chardon, a.k.a. Rubempré, a young, famous writer in the Angoulême region who dreams of Parisian glory. This literary trail in the footsteps of Honoré de Balzac and his character will take you on a discovery of the various districts of Angoulême where the author describes his perceptions of the city and Lucien's life there.
